Wesley J. Fontecchio, 85, of Breitung Twp., passed away on December 21, 2021, at Manor Care Nursing Home in Kingsford.

Wesley was born on June 11, 1936, in Iron Mountain, the son of the late John and Clare (Richards) Fontecchio. He was a lifelong resident of this area and attended Kingsford Schools. Wes was a talented builder, welder, fabricator, and inventor. It was common knowledge you could bring anything to Wes, and he could fix it, car, semi truck, airplane, or household appliance. His inventions included Snowgrip, a metal roof coating, Cream Tote, Super-Grate and many others. In addition, Wes owned and operated Wes's Alignment Center. Wes was a pilot and built a couple airplanes in his home. He was also a longtime member of the EAA in Oshkosh. Wes enjoyed putting together model airplanes, doing woodburning projects and building small electric cars. His days usually started at Maple Creek restaurant having breakfast with Mark Blomquist his business partner. Before that he was a lifelong member of the Big Boy coffee group. Wes loved visiting his friends at Family Ties, riding around in his red convertible "Lil' Bit," watching WWE wrestling, attending the yearly family trips to the Kalahari in Wisconsin Dells and spending time with his dog, Shelby.

Wes is survived by his children, Jeff Fontecchio of Iron Mountain, Scott (Cindy Schnarre) Fontecchio of Incline Village, NV and Sandra (Dave Sleik) Fontecchio of Iron Mountain; grandsons, Parker Fontecchio and Cully Lantz; brother, Don (Ann) Fontecchio of Fond du Lac, WI; sister, Jean (Mel) Kallenbach of Niagara, WI; many nieces and nephews; his beloved pet, Shelby; his care workers, Paula Vretenar and Tara Marshall; and his family at Family Ties.

“ Wesley is my brother and we did a lot of things together all our lives. One thing about Wes he would always help anyone do anything and never look to be paid back. Wes would do things none of us or I would do ever like climb the outside of an old broken down fire tower on Milli hill, climb up to the top of a tree to pick the larger pine cones, build and fly/crash his home made helicopter, weld cracked airplane aluminum gas tanks, just to share a few of the wild things he would do. When it came to doing normal things like golf/fish/hunt/travel he rather watch paint dry. He always wanted to make something better, he invented a cast iron hollow insert with a blower for your fireplace. The fireplace inserts of the day primarily gave heat from the flames so Wes made his insert lay in the heated colds that were much hotter. Many of the older metal roofs on large stores didn't have any ice retaining pods and people were being injured by ice crashing down in the Spring of the year. Wes spent years perfecting and patenting a paint solution with gripping material to hold the ice in place and melt away in the sun. One of his last inventions was a short step ladder that was safer to stand on by having a wider step. Wes was a doer and had some medical issues that slowed him down or who knows what ALL he may have accomplished. God Bless him and his family. Respectively his brother Don
