KINGSFORD - Ernest R. Perdue, 84, of 517 Edison St. Kingsford, died Saturday, Feb. 18, 2006, at Hackley Hospital in Muskegon, lower Michigan. He was born on Sept. 9, 1921, in Maybeury, W.V., the son of the late Joseph and Anava (Prewitt) Perdue.
