IRON MOUNTAIN - Jeanette Fortner, 82, of 301 Madison Ave., Iron Mountain, passed away on Thursday, June 15, 2006, at Freeman Nursing and Rehabilitation Community in Kingsford.

Jeanette was born Dec. 23, 1923, in Iron Mountain, daughter of the late John and Concetta (Rainaldi) Pietrantonio. She graduated from Iron Mountain High School in 1942 and was a lifelong resident of the area. Following high school, Jeanette was a nanny for the Verette family in Virginia. For four years during World War II, she was a stenographer at the Pentagon Building.

Jeanette married Vincent "Jim" Pezzullo on May 12, 1946, in New York. He preceded her in death in 1962.

On July 23, 1963, Jeanette married John "Jock" Fortner and he preceded her in death in 1993. Jeanette was a member of St. Mary and St. Joseph Catholic Church, the American Legion Auxiliary, and a former member of the Daughters of Isabella. She enjoyed cooking for her family, card club, playing bingo and bus trips to the casino.

Jeanette is survived by four children, James (Carol) Pezzullo of Kingsford, Kathleen Pezzullo of Kingsford, Gregory Pezzullo of Iron Mountain and Lisa
