



Dr. Ralph E. Carlson

October 28, 1921 - November 23, 2016

Dr. Ralph Everett Carlson, 95, passed away on November 23, 2016, after a full life and surrounded by loved ones.

Ralph came from very humble beginnings, born in the farming town of Prentice, Wisconsin on October 28th, 1921 to parents Alice and Ben Carlson. After graduating from Kingsford High School, he worked nights and weekends to put himself through Augustana College. He then attended medical school, enrolling in the US Army's program at the University of Illinois- Chicago and completing his internship/residency at Cook County Hospital. While in Chicago, he met his wife Cynthia Alexander of Iron Mountain, to whom he was married for 69 years.

After leaving Cook County Hospital, Dr. Carlson completed a two-year residency in surgery at Percy Jones Army Hospital in Battle Creek, Michigan, during which time his first daughter was born. He was honorably discharged as a Captain (US Army Medical Corps), and then spent another 3 1/2 years at Henry Ford Hospital in Detroit where he qualified as American Board Certified in surgery, and became a father of two more daughters. A Fellow of the highly respected American College of Surgeons, Dr. Carlson eventually was chosen its examiner.

In 1953, the Carlson family moved home to Iron Mountain where Ralph began

his surgical practice with his father-in-law, the late Dr. William H. Alexander. Ralph practiced surgery for 33 years, during which he often expressed his gratitude in finding a like-minded partner in Dr. Paul Trump. In addition, he was grateful for the dedicated doctors and nurses with whom he was privileged to practice medicine while at Dickinson County Memorial Hospital (DCH), where he served as Chief of the Medical Staff and Chief of Surgery. Ralph was deeply respected for his gracious manner, his "magic hands" in the operating room, and his love of good music. When he retired, his former patients often wrote letters to him, praising his skills and declaring how much they missed him as their doctor.

Throughout his life, Ralph was active in the community that he loved so dearly. As co-founder of the Dickinson County Memorial Hospital Foundation, one of his proudest accomplishments, he helped raise over a million dollars to support a variety of programs and equipment purchases. He was also an active member of the DCH Board of Trustees and the Chamber of Commerce. At the time of his death, he was a member of the 6-7-8 Club, the Chippewa Club, Pine Grove Country Club and Our Savior's Lutheran Church.

Ralph was an avid sportsman and loved the great outdoors, having been an excellent tennis player and downhill skier in his younger years. He relished recounting stories about his numerous hunting and fishing trips to Montana, British Columbia, Alaska and north of the Arctic Circle. On a more local level, he loved spending time with his friends and family on Sun Dog Lake. Many fond memories of deer hunting, snowmobiling and Christmas tree cutting parties at this magical place have been shared over the years. After retiring and moving to Spread Eagle, Wisconsin, he and Cynthia took up cross country skiing with friends, often skiing for miles on the frozen lake and swamps behind it. In the summer, Ralph turned his focus to golf, a passion of his throughout his entire life. He played until his 94th year, once sinking a 30 foot putt, despite being classified as legally blind due to macular degeneration.

Ralph was also an excellent cook and early advocate of the “farm to table” concept, often driving miles to find his favorite sweet white corn. Ralph especially loved when his extended family gathered around one of the dinners that he helped prepare. Family, good food and good conversations (along with wins by his beloved Packers) were things that made him happy. Many a recipe card containing one of “Ralph’s Recipes” will now contain tear stains – a result of realizing that he will no longer be there to enjoy the meal.

Above all, Ralph was blessed to have a wonderful extended family both here in the UP and in Bonita Springs, FL where he spent many winters. Thanks to his zest for life and love of family (no doubt a key to his longevity), Ralph’s children and grandchildren spent countless happy summer vacations at Spread Eagle. A rainy day never kept him down – there was always a card game to play with “the kids” – especially gin. Ralph will always be remembered and loved for his wry (even wicked) sense of humor, gentle nature, and compassionate attitude. He will be greatly missed by all those who loved him.

Dr. Carlson was preceded in death by his parents and brothers, Waldo and Duane Carlson. He is survived by his wife Cynthia and three daughters Deborah (Norm) Miede, Meredith Carlson, and Marsha (Ted) Hodges, and his grandchildren who adored him –Teddy and Gavin Hodges; Mara, Nick and Lisa Herron; and Nick, Matt, and Dan Miede. .

Thank you to all the people who kept Ralph close to them in his final years. He was extremely grateful, and spoke fondly of you all.
